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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, this is one time I'm going to stick to what is before us, and that is Senator Kristensen's amendment. This whole process has gotten unduly complicated, it is very confused, because the befuddlers in the executive branch have gotten involved. People have called the federal officials and asked them to put pressure on the Legislature. Some guy who calls himself a judge, and if I had time I was going to check his credentials to see if he ever took and passed the bar examination, if he ever in fact was a judge, and if he no longer is a judge, did he leave the bench voluntarily? That's the way I usually check these kind of things out, because when you got a big shot federal official who's a judge, Senator Coordsen, see, you and I are easily impressed. You're out there on your tractor and I'm...still got the barber mentality. I mean somebody with the title judge is awfully impressive and awe-inspiring. So for this judge, who is also a federal official, to drop everything he's got, to come traipsing out here to Nebraska, which is not politically potent on the national scene, really makes me wonder, who has that kind of clout in Nebraska, and what is going on here? We have something more than just child support collection. We didn't have anybody from the federal government, as far as I know, coming here on that nuclear waste facility matter, and that involves other states and much more crucial matters as far as the life of the state and the people as a whole than this bill. But we didn't have a judge coming out here for that. We were talking about a boundary dispute between Nebraska and one of those states to the south of Nebraska, it's hard for me to keep them straight. No judge came here to tell us about that. But then I'm in my office, doing my work and, Senator Bohlke, what do I hear? (Knock, knock, knock.) And I go open the door, and it is a host of state officials, even I think Mr. Wusk was there, too. And in the middle of this conclave of people was the judge. And I knew we were into something then. But after listening to the judge, listening to all the things that have been said, I think this thing has been convoluted, twisted and turned for purposes other than just insuring that child support payments that are made will get to the custodial parent as they are supposed to. I think Senator Kristensen's amendment is clean enough, it contains the essence of the issues we have to deal with to be a good starting point. So I'm going to support
