green sheet that Senator Elaine Stuhr handed out and I will tell you I'm rather proud of that. And I think all of you ought to be here proud of that and all Nebraskans ought to be proud of that because that is the result of what our previous checkoff has done along with some General Funds. An interesting thing to me is, as I was looking at these, they're good jobs and particularly the giant plant with multicapacities for different products at Blair is unbelievable and it's going to be forever, as long as we need the plant, the high fructose syrup, all the things that they produce. So I'm kind of surprised actually that we want to slow down the engine that is working so well in Nebraska. I will tell you to be straightforward about this, I introduced a bill just like Senator Wickersham has here to stop the General Funds and to stop the checkoff as of December 31st of this year because it was apparent, under our present agreement, we were going to have a surplus in the fund. But I had always...I did that in January, but I had always said if there was new or expanded production I would listen to some opportunities. I hadn't been aware at that time that there was expansion contemplated going on. It is true the California market at least appears to be something that is on the horizon. The issue of methanol not being the product that it was thought it was to be is going to be making a difference. I think it will make more of a demand for ethanol. The plants that, so even though we've met our agreements and there's enough money to do that without having these checkoffs continued in the General Fund, there is expansion being projected. The one at Imperial is very interesting and is hinging on, it's going to be built. It's either going to be in Colorado or it's going to be in Nebraska. The one at Sutherland is coming on line and will provide a market in that part of the state. If you happened to look geographically, that's going to be spread out, and the other ones are contemplating expansion. And even if it didn't add a dime to the price of corn, it seems to me the jobs that's providing, the good jobs it's providing, most of these are going to be in rural Nebraska where the options are going to be available for local farmers, if you will, to have good jobs as well as a market for their corn. So the upshot of this is I do oppose Senator Wickersham's amendment. We are reducing the checkoff, by the way, via Senator Elaine Stuhr's present situation in the bill that it's now a half a cent instead of three-quarters. So I believe that a half a cent for one more
