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based on Senator Don Pederson's comments, it's quite clear that Sutherland can't come back into production; it's never been in production. And it, I don't know whether it ever will be in production. I don't know how many times we've chased that project around this floor. The last time we chased it around the floor, Senator Bernard-Stevens was sitting in Senator Don Pederson's chair. I don't know whether that plant will ever produce anything. I shouldn't even hazard a guess about it, but as I understand the existing law, even with my amendment, that Sutherland, if it come...if it does come into production would benefit by the existing credit program. Now whether it'd benefit as much as it might want, I don't know, but the people who have invested millions of dollars couldn't know that Senator Stuhr was going to bring this bill and get the result that she is seeking tonight and benefit them even more than they ever hoped for when they started out. So I can't imagine that that makes much difference, or should make much difference to those rational investors. Now something that really started to bother me about this program, and I will confess that what I know about ethanol tonight isn't a heck of a lot more than I knew about ethanol two weeks ago, because this program just mystifies me. Every time I look at it, and I used to just not look at it because I figured that my friends in agriculture would settle their differences, and I could vote with them, and I didn't even have to understand it. But I finally came to the conclusion that we were just giving away money, and not only were we giving away money, it was costing the folks that I represent money, and I just couldn't take that anymore. I knew we'd struck a deal and I was willing to stick with the deal. But what Senator Stuhr and others are now proposing is simply not sticking with the deal. They want my folks to pay more, and they want to give more away, and I'm just not going to support that. How much have we given these companies? We gave them LB 775 credits. That is generous in the first place. Then we gave them more money. How much money does it take to make a business profitable? How much of state money does it take to make a business profitable? And what will happen, if ever, the program that Senator Stuhr now wants to have extended a little bit ever expires? What will happen to these poor companies that have been living at our doorstep? What will happen to them? What should happen to them? What should happen to them is that they have to find a way to make money on their own. They ought to
