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SENATOR BEUTLER: Is it...

SENATOR DIERKS: ...expensive, very costly.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Some of the regulations sound like it's for protection of workers. Others sound like they're for the protection of surrounding areas.

SENATOR DIERKS: That's true, but...

SENATOR BEUTLER: But there's no...have they had some sort of problem with human health, or human...

SENATOR DIERKS: No, there's been no problem that we know of with human health, we just think it's a degree of overregulation. And a lot of the requirements that we're talk...that I read to you here are already in place, it's just that they're reemphasizing them. The main thing we're concerned about is the loss of the use of the fumigant.

SENATOR BEUTLER: And you think that these restrictions effectively do that, or are just leading in that direction?

SENATOR DIERKS: We think that it can effectively do that. We think it gives them the power.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time.

SENATOR DIERKS: They are taking that authority now to do that. And we think that we need to...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Time. (Visitor introduced.) Further debate on the resolution? Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Beutler, do you have anymore discussion about the issue?

SENATOR BEUTLER: Just...just a couple other small questions. Are they requiring even existing facilities to have a 500 foot buffer?
