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example, I may come from New York to a convention in Omaha, but if I stay in Council Bluffs, instead of Omaha, does that make any difference in the calculation?

SENATOR LANDIS: In the way that I know this kind of thing has...has been constructed for a paper trail, an auditable paper trail, the pieces of information that are necessary is where does the person come from, as in out of state, and secondly, where is the convention and how long is it? The assumption, your multiplier and the econometric model should take into account, if it's demonstrable, some kind of slippage. But there isn't a, and where did you stay when you were here? And, how much was the fee at that motel? Were you on this side of the river, or that side of the river? I've traveled many places, I can tell you that you stay close to the convention center. That's what I've always done, I bet you do, too. That's going to be the working assumption. There isn't on its face in this language a requirement that you track it down to the place the person stayed. And I'm going to guess that the econometric model will make that assumption, but it also might make some variation or leakage off of that, if that's demonstrable.

SENATOR RAIKES: Okay, but you...you've, I guess, made clear some of the concerns you might have. If you have a thousand people at a convention, in order for it to qualify, 501 of them need to have an out-of-state address, but it's conceivable that, of those 501, some percentage, maybe a significant percentage, could, while they're attending a convention in Omaha, stay in another state, particularly Iowa. And, in fact, may even eat some of their meals in Iowa. That attendee would be regarded the same as a person who's...who stayed in Omaha and did all the business in Omaha. And, in fact, either one of those attendees would in some sense be regarded the same as a person who maybe happened to live in Omaha, stay at home during the convention and simply go back and forth from his or her home to the convention.

SENATOR LANDIS: The obligation is to create a multiplier. They're based on an econometric model generally. On its face, there is nothing in the language that treats those people differently. There is an obligation to create an audit and there is the obligation to create a multiplier and to base the
