SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...these bonds. That has already been made clear in the bill, as drafted. And we cannot bind future Legislatures. And as long as I'm here, if this bill passes in the present form, there's not going to be an automatic appropriation that's going to go through, and I'll probably be here longer than any...any other senator from Omaha. I live right in the heart of my district. I love my district. I love the people I represent and I don't want to see some project that's going to hurt them from now in perpetuity, and so I will fight this issue and I will do what is necessary. Ten days, each day that passes gives me leverage and, brothers and sisters, those of you whose bill I use, understand it will just be a temporary sidetracking, but that will be necessary to make sure that LB 382 does not pass.
