the city government and the state government to, let's say, the city and, let's say, the county in which they did such a thing. I will tell you this. I think it would be fair to say that the current expectation is that general obligation bonds would be used and lease purchase revenue bonds would not be used.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, but getting back to my key question, the ownership of this facility must be in a public body.

SENATOR LANDIS: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, thank you. Members of the Legislature, there's language in this bill which shouldn't even be here because, practically speaking, Omaha could not have a facility which is owned by a private entity and then it be qualified as an eligible facility. The only way that facility can be eligible is that it is publicly owned. So if it's an existing structure which Omaha wants to utilize, Omaha would have to purchase it first. Omaha has to get ownership of it and then other things start. So, based on these questions and Senator Landis's response, I hope it's clear why I was asking why lease purchase is even included in the definition of bonds, because it's not going to happen. And those senators from Omaha, whose names are on this bill, ought to be looking at these things like I am. And these rural senators, who are going to obligate the state in a quasi fashion, should be paying attention to this bill. But, personally, I don't care if they don't, because I look good in it. I am the one who understands the bill. Well, Senator Landis is from Lincoln and what do you expect from him? He understands everything anyway. But he hasn't been as verbal as I have been. Even Senator Bruning, who has become chatty and talkative in recent days has not commented on this, and I think it's all to the good because I'm going to ask my rural colleagues what would happen if Senator Dierks introduced his livestock bill, then all the rural senators left the floor? What would happen to it? But when it comes to Omaha, you all are the suckers. The Omaha senators leave the floor and you all are going to come through for them. They've dictated to you, you've got to vote cloture, but if you vote cloture then we take eight more hours on Final Reading and deal with some other bills too. We need to play hardball now and point out exactly what's happening here, and I intend to do it. But what I was doing the
