to me, that's a big part of this particular bill, is we're talking about new money. Now, in the rural areas, let's say, and Senator Vrtiska suggested that his district may not build a convention center, that may be true. Not every...not all 49 of us are going to have a convention center built in our district, in fact a very small percentage of us. I think that's...that's accurate. I doubt my district will see anything directly either. But there...the catch here, the thing that brought both rural and urban interests together, is that 30 percent of that attributable revenue goes into a fund that can be used by communities across Nebraska for various things, for a wide range of uses, including convention centers, but a lot of different things, 30 percent. So if, imagine with me that the city of Omaha goes forward with this, and I think that's a safe bet. If the city of Omaha goes forward after this bill is passed and decides to build a convention center, let's assume, and I think the numbers show there will be about \$3 million a year in new sales and income tax that the state would throw back to the city of Omaha to help pay for the convention center. Thirty percent of that amount, \$900,000 a year, goes into the fund that rural communities can access. Don Macke, director of the Nebraska Rural Development Commission, has been instrumental in helping structure how that fund will be allocated, and rural members of the Revenue Committee, were very forceful in playing a part in how that money could be spent. So that's 30 percent or \$900,000 a year that you'd never see, new money, found money brought into this fund, spent for rural communities. And I guess the last thing I would say, there has been discussion on this floor that...and Senator Chambers has said that some of us from Omaha are not participating, we're not being involved in the debate. Well, I tell you, folks, let's tell it like it is here. I hate to use the "F" word on the...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BRUNING: ...floor, but I'm going to use the "F" word. This is a filibuster. This is one member of the Legislature deciding to stall the proceedings to receive further concessions. Now we hate to use the "F" word out here on the floor, but this is what it is. It's a filibuster. And so from...in my mind, if Senator Chambers wants to filibuster, that's fine. That's his prerogative. Any of us can do that.
