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But I'm not going to stand here and help him by debating for hours. I'm grateful that Senator Landis, who understands the bill better than any of us, has helped to clarify some questions, but, in general, I'm not going to help Senator Chambers filibuster.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bruning. Senator Chambers, on your Amendment, AM158.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, you talk about a cop out. If ever I...he doesn't know much about the bill. He doesn't understand it. That's what that's about. He shouldn't have said a word, any word. And I don't need his help at all. Senator Landis, I can understand your pique, p-i-q-u-e, and maybe it's a bit of frustration, but yours is as nothing compared to mine. See, I have backed away from a principle of mine. When I say I'm taking a thing 24 hours, I mean it. Now if these people have played me for a sucker, they're going to pay. And if my rural colleagues help them, the Legislature's going to pay. I'm not going to be toyed with. When I started on this, I wasn't talking about anything...not...not conceding anything. Everybody could see the types of amendments that I was offering. Not one of those amendment...well, maybe one or two of them could have had some significance. I had stated in the beginning my intent is not to improve the bill. I want this bad, poorly drafted, slapdash, slipshod piece of legislation to become law so that it would forever reflect on the geniuses who put it together. Then I began to listen to people about the quality of laws that ought to go on the books and this, as it's drafted now, this bill, is embarrassing to me, as a member of the Legislature. To have something as embarrassingly written as this should never happen at the hands of a responsible Legislature. But I'm going to deal with the Legislature the way the Legislature deals with me. And if you all are willing to have us do this, fine. This is the way I said I was going to do it. I'm doing what I said I would do. Now Senator Landis said I'll keep you here as long as I want to. Senator Landis, I'll keep us here as long as I have to, and there's a subtle difference that I hope you will pick up. If I have to go the eight hours, I will. And Senator Bruning doesn't have to say anything. None of these Omaha senators have to say anything. And their little comments that
