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the use of the words "regular primary or general election" in the amendment.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Okay, and that's...that's the other issue that I'm listening to is that's a statewide primary and not a municipal city one or do I know?

SENATOR LANDIS: No, in fact, I don't think you do know. My guess is if it was a...if there were other issues and there was...one has a municipal general election (interruption)...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yeah, but...can...if...

SENATOR LANDIS: ...a statewide election on occasion, when we refer to constitutional amendments, things like that, so I'm going to guess, in this case, that a municipal election that was a genuine primary or general election would constitute that kind of an election.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Senator Landis, and, Senator Chambers, that the purpose for doing that is just so I understand what we want to accomplish and I think...I think everybody is on the same wavelength of what we want to accomplish. It's just, can we get there to do that? I think that we can, but as we go through if I raise that issue a little bit later, I think there's a refinement problem, I assume that doesn't nix the understandings that are here and...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...do you understand where I am trying to head, Senator?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I had assumed that it would be at...during a state kind of election but I don't want to nix it either so if that becomes something that would derail it, that's not what I'm trying to do. So while you and the Speaker speak, let me talk to Senator Lynch a second off the mike.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: And that's the purpose, I think, is that the constitution makes no reference to a primary election. We
