have them, and I think that it talks about, and that's the reason I've got my...I want to do a little work on that issue as well, but the real thrust of what you're doing here is that what we normally would think of as a regular primary or the general election is when the bond issues would come up, but they wouldn't be called for specific things, and that makes good policy sense because it probably would cost, what, a half a million dollars plus to call that special election. That money could well be spent doing lots of other things instead of doing the special election. You'll probably get a hundred different opinions as to whether that strategically is a good thing because there will be those that think it'd be guaranteed if that's the only reason you'd come out. I don't know. The issue is what do we think is a good policy, and at this point, I like the sounds of that and I think that's what everybody's intentions would be to do, the 51 percent. I don't know if that's precedential for other things that we're going to do in the future, but for this one, it makes...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...it makes for a good compromise. Senator Chambers, I yield to you the rest of my time.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. Senator Lynch and I, Senator Landis, had meant for it to apply to a statewide election, and that means that the first primary would be next spring or in November of next year, whereas if it was a municipal election, it could be thrown off beyond that. So the intent is to make it statewide, so whatever language has to be done, put in to make that clear, could you take care of that? And that's all that I have. Senator Landis did nod yes.
