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LB 382

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Senator Landis. There are no further lights. Senator Chambers, would you wish to close on your amendment?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Madam President, all I want to point out is that before Senator Landis spoke, I had said some time ago that the \$20 was won by Senator Tyson, because the discussion...I did not take the discussion eight hours. So when I make a wager, I pay off. No matter what factors intervene to affect the outcome, when the outcome is other than that which was wagered on, you lose. If I were betting on a football game and it turns out, after the fact, that one of the players cheated or the referee cheated, the final score is what determines the winner and the loser. So, on this one, the \$20 goes to Senator Tyson, based on a bet that I made. Now it's up to him to decide between himself and the stakeholder. But I do want this amendment adopted. I am not in support of the bill. And I think what Senator Tyson said is correct. This bill is not a favor to the citizenry at large in Omaha, but the powerful powers that be feel that they're getting their way. However, with the recent adoption of that quarter of a billion dollar bond issue, I doubt that something like this is going to have easy sledding, even when the big shots and the deep pockets begin to ply their trade and tell the public that somehow this is going to be in the best interest of anybody. But I'll have a chance to say a few more words when we get to the point of trying to advance the bill. I had said I may offer other amendments. I have offered all that I intend to offer. I still think the bill is not in very good shape as far as draftpersonship. But it is not my responsibility to take care of all of those aspects of the bill. But I will have some negative comments to make about the bill itself when we reach the point of the motion to advance and the debate that can be had pursuant to that motion. But on this motion, this amendment, it's all right for you to adopt it, but it's also all right, if you don't, but I think you should, if you want to. But, if you don't, well,.... (Laughter)

SENATOR SCHIMEK: If you want to adopt the FA232, please vote aye, those opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of
