SENATOR JENSEN: I think the convention center itself will generate enough money to retire its indebtedness.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Madam President, members, I wasn't going to say anything on this and I probably shouldn't. But good things happen, I guess, when people work together. And I'm glad to see these two sides come together. I made my decision when I asked myself a question, what's this bill going to do for me? What will the center in Omaha do for me? And I said to myself, that's the wrong way to look at it, we should not think what it's going to do for me. We can't live in an isolated world, those days are gone. We have to live together, we have to do what's best for all of us, and I really, sincerely believe that the days are gone when you have to isolate yourself. This body, all over, you have to work together, and it shows it right here, it shows it right here, the compromise. I've been sitting back here and looking, and listening and all the confusion, all the commotion with our good Clerk, O'Donnell, up there, and with Dick and everybody, everybody, they all come together with a...like a bunch of ants around. But...but it made for good reasoning, made for good policy. You have to do this. It just worked out. When you have to ask yourself, what's it going to do for me, those are the wrong questions.
