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and that formula is the one we're utilizing today, and that they were the first ones out of the chute and said, here is a system, if you will follow it and how it will work that you can have a...they call it a template, where you put in 40 percent...40 percent of property tax of aid, and then of tuition and other needs, and so that you can put money into their formula and get dollar-for-dollar property tax lowering, and that's what the beauty of their formula is. What will happen is that you're going to see, when the... And the reason that this was done, I think there's a lot of people who wanted to do the credit in the first year. You've got a lot of trouble...and this would be the general credit on the property tax statement, but you had problems with change of the century, you had problems with getting computer changes and a formatting of property tax statements done quickly. And so the community colleges appear to be the easiest way and the best way of getting direct property tax relief by putting money into that system without changing the system. You can use an existing formula. The second year will be the credit onto people's property tax. But they're going to see last year and they're going to see the community college amount being much lower. And then the very next year, because we're not going to put money into the community college the second year, it's going to be a credit on their tax statement. Everybody is going to go, those terrible community colleges, why look at their increase, they went up 50 percent. Now is that the community college's doing? No, absolutely not. But it will show on their tax statement in a very superficial way that the community colleges had this tremendous increase, of which they did not. And so this amendment would say take the community colleges off that printout, for that first year so that you don't see that big bump. That causes the counties some problems. That causes formatting of the...of the tax, it won't add up direc...you know, won't add up, and people are going to question it. But the issue is, I want to make very, very plain on the floor of the Legislature, is that that is not the community college's fault in that second year when you see the printout on your property tax statement, that they didn't have a huge increase. It was due to the fact that this one...the first year of the plan we're going to pump money into it, and the second year that money is going to go away, it's going to go in some other direction. What I would say to you at this point is the
