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than....I know you mentioned that it was their formula. But,...and I'm concerned about the short-term effect of this, as well as the long-term effect of this. And I...I wonder if you could help me understand a little bit your thought process in just doing it for one year.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: I...I can tell you my opinion of that. Obviously they won't let me sit in the Revenue Committee anymore, the way I voted a couple times this year, I don't think they'd ever let me back in. But, it would...it certainly...if you're going to design a system of giving some monies and...and what I would call leveling out the playing field, so you don't have so many bumps in the road with property tax, that this upcoming year most of the...most of the savings that have occurred, and actually the desire was to level out property tax and find an acceptable level and not to always drive them down. But that you, to avoid this bump back up this year, that you needed something that was, one, fairly quick and didn't require hiring a bunch of new people to, for example, issue a check, or for changing the computer programs, or for designing a new formula, that you really didn't have any, you know, that wasn't tried and true. This...this one will work and work fairly well. And it is across the state, so it isn't localized. You know, if you do it for some NRDs, for some it would work, for others it didn't. Everybody has a fairly uniform community college, and those levies are close enough together that it will have, not exactly dollar-for-dollar, but roughly the same impact all over, that's the first year. I think there was then some desire to go with checks back. But, if you can't do a checkback, do a credit and a change in the property tax statements, so people can see what they were getting. Now, as we go along, that...that point would be...wanted to talk about what are those property tax statements actually going to look like, and what are they going to show.

SENATOR SUTTLE: Will the 2.5 percent reduction...credit on our tax statements, will that be for the entire bill, or just for community colleges?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: The community colleges would not be reflected on the property tax statement as a change. The property tax statement is going to change in, what, the second
