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frankly, when you get to that third year and the money is set aside for the dime drop in schools, then you're not going to see a credit number. And so I think it would be healthy to look at what that property tax statement might say each of those three years...

SENATOR SUTTLE: Right.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: ...to do. And so a prototype, I hope someone can find one and provide it to you.

SENATOR SUTTLE: Yes, I think that would be very helpful. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Suttle. (Visitors introduced.) On the Kristensen amendment, Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Yes, Mr. President and members. We've had a number of questions with regard to the community colleges. And I certainly understand their apprehension. And part of that reason was pointed out earlier, I think, by Senator Kristensen, as he gave us a recap of what's happened with property taxes and the reduction we've had over the years. People seemed to oftentimes not remember when we've had a reduction, but only when there's an increase, and all of you know that very well. And it brought me back thinking about the sheet that I had quoted earlier in the session, talking about property tax relief, that we had realized in this state, in a number of counties, that when we averaged it statewide it may not have looked that great. But we went from Adams County of 12.5, Antelope County 13, we have...it's hard to follow, Banner 14 percent, Blaine 13 percent. But then we get to Dawes and Dawson, 26 and 24 percent reduction in property tax, that's a great deal. And I told Senator Baker, I gave him warning that I was going to remind him of this, of a speech earlier in the session, when he said he had all the people in his store complaining about their property taxes. And I said, now, I want to go over this one more time, what county was that? And he said, that was Hitchcock County. And we look at Hitchcock County, and I remember I said, it's minus 27.6 percent, and yet poor Senator Baker had to, in his store, talk to the people who were angry that we hadn't done anything about property tax. So
