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point where you can see the taxes you paid the prior year before, and I think that's something that people across the state will think is an improvement. And part of this, the other information that they said that it will show as far as the credit and the past due, I think those are all good things that will be information presented to the public in a very easy form to understand, and you aren't going to have to go back and look for that postcard to compare year to year. And it will also be...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Time.

SENATOR BOHLKE: ...a reminder so that I won't have to get up and read, maybe, these reductions. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Bromm, on the Kristensen amendment.

SENATOR BROMM: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor. And I had originally turned my light on before I realized what the fate of this amendment was going to be. But I do have a couple of questions that I would like to ask someone. And it goes...and there may be more of this needed later. But it goes more to understanding the mechanics and trying to think of how the mechanics will work down at the county level. Perhaps, Senator Wickersham, if you would be kind enough to yield to...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Wickersham.

SENATOR BROMM: ...a couple of questions. Senator Wickersham, first of all, beginning in 1999, with the community college aspect of this amendment, there really is no...there is little or no involvement of the county in the mechanics of applying that aspect of this relief.

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: In fact none.

SENATOR BROMM: None. So, the 30...the \$30 million is transferred to the Educational Fund that is state aid to community colleges?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes, I don't remember the name of the fund.
