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will show a state credit. The third year that money is going to go into funding the dime drop. So you won't see on that statement, you're not going to see that credit being listed there, and so you need to be aware of what that's...it's...you're going to have the property tax relief, it's going to...or the money will be there, but it necessarily won't show up in the statement. I think people need to understand that, or at least that's as I understand the amendment. The other portion is that you have to factor in there that if there is some valuation growth that will decrease the impact of that to some degree, but you'll also have an increase in state spending because that funding of the credit gets taken off. I mean it's like an appropriation. And so somebody will come in that second year and say, Senator Wehrbein, my goodness, you've got a 7 or 8 percent growth in spending this year. Well, realize that when we're doing this that's...that...that money is going to, in effect, get put into that, into that credit. That will be an expenditure. And it will be even exaggerated more when you go to fund the dime drop. And so when you pay...that's another \$84 million that you're going to have to pay for state aid to schools unless you adopt the Kristensen amendment from LB 149 that we had. That's just an aside. But if you're going to fully fund that, you're also going to see your state growth of spending go up again. So the desire to have property tax is high, but realize that there's...we're going to fit into the same pattern that we've been doing. We're going to spend some money here at the state level to attempt to have some impact on those property taxes. You're still going to have those that are going to say you're spending too much and look at your increase in spending, and we're going to have a...we're always going to have a tough time of saying, but we've reduced property taxes. In effect, what you're going to do is hold down the growth and you're not necessarily going to have that dramatic drop in property tax, and so I see this as a regulator. And I'll yield my time back and answer questions as...as people may field them. Thank you.
