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SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Yes.

SENATOR JONES: Could you explain a little more details on that credit. It's a 2.5 percent that would be...showed up in your county. Should that be...will that show up on your tax or will that just be handled in the courthouse? Will it show up on your tax receipt? I think I understood earlier that it might show up what you paid last year and what you're paying this year so you could see the difference. Could you go through that just a little bit more for me?

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: Certainly. We've distributed, and I hope all of you have had a chance to look at it, it's a single sheet of paper, it actually has two tax notices on it. The idea is, and normally when you see this there's a perforation in the middle and it isn't...it looks like one page, but, anyway, one would be the current year, one would be the prior year. If you look at the current year, what is marked as current year, you can see what...an example of what it would look like in the second year. There'd be a state tax credit line. It would be as a portion of a tax rate to be applied against valuation. And then, out in the tax amount, there would actually be a number in brackets. We've put \$35 million in there because that's the statewide total. We really have no way at the moment of calculating what the tax rate number, would go into the middle column, is or the number that you might see in the outside column is. But that negative number in the tax amount column that represents the credit would be off the total tax amount and would reduce the amount that you see in the boxes down below as total tax or total due. So you would actually see a negative number on your...in the tax amount column that offsets some of the amounts above.

SENATOR JONES: Thank you. You might tell me a little bit then how they are going to handle it in the courthouse besides what they send out to us. Isn't it a 2.5 percent that there will be...

SENATOR WICKERSHAM: No, I don't know what percentage it will be. That depends on valuations across the state. We've got \$35 million allocated. It's just kind of a reverse process to determine the number. If we had set that number at 2.5 then we
