upper limits of that liability are found. What are you going to do? Increase the sales tax? Increase the income tax to pay that contingency? And that contingency, think about this for a minute, that contingency doesn't have anything to do with the economic cycles. This Reserve Fund is for the stabilization when the long-term economy turns bad and your revenues go down, but this Reserve Fund can be wiped out, if this bill passes, just by...just by one lawsuit. And then what happens when the economic cycle goes into its downside? We have no reserve at all to deal with the situation. Now, if this...if taking money out of the Reserve Fund like this was some permanent form of property tax relief, it might all be much more understandable, but it's not permanent. It can't be sustained. You can only do this for two or three years and then you're out of money in the Reserve...in the Reserve Fund. If we want to do more property tax...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...relief, we need to appropriate the money and do it so that it is stable property tax relief. The way this fund is going to work, one year you have it and one year you don't. The public is going to go nuts trying to figure out what we're doing. Why would we give them...why do we give them a little bit of credit, a 30- or 40-dollar credit this year, and next year we didn't give them any at all? The Reserve Fund is not the way to do this. It is bad public policy. It is unstable, it is unsustainable, and the Governor himself didn't do it when he was Mayor of Lincoln. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. On the Chambers amendment, Senator Tyson. On the Chambers amendment? On the Chambers amendment, Senator Kristensen.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. I don't see any problem with the Chambers amendment. I think I'd be interested to hear the response of the Revenue Committee, but at least from my point of view, Senator Chambers, this work is a product really of the Legislature through the Revenue Committee working with the Governor's Office, and I don't see it as a one proposal or another. I really do see this as a joint venture and, quite
