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a lid on our own actions. We can meet, we can be called into session by our own vote or by the order of the Governor, and we can fix whatever is going to happen, to the best of our limited abilities. The only other point that I would really like to make is, however, this has been...this has been referred to as property tax relief. Sooner or later the view will prevail that what we need is property tax abolition. All the money paid into the state or, pardon me, into the counties on property tax and disbursed out by them or disbursed out by the school district is paid for by income or by capital. If you pay it out of capital too long you'll be bankrupt. Eventually, it is all out of income. The state has two forms of easily regulated, easily accounted for sources of money, income streams--income tax and sales tax. It is a futile exercise to tax property. Eventually, all that money has to come from income and that is easier to tax, easier to adjust, easier to refund, if necessary, but it lacks the constituency that property tax has in the state of Nebraska. At some time, the view will prevail that property tax is a nineteenth century anachronism that should be done away with.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR TYSON: And, with that, I will again urge everyone here to vote for the committee amendments, you can use both hands just like I'm going to, and support then the bill at the Final Reading. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Tyson. Continued discussion, Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Mr. Lieutenant Governor, members of the body. I've been a strong proponent of the Governor's plan from the very first day that he spoke it to the people of Nebraska. I think it's important that we hold faith with the people and that we support our administration. I think it's important that we work together. And so many times we see one branch of government working against another, trying to be the hero and making the other one look like the bad guy. I think this was a good time for us to work together and certainly that occurred in negotiations between the Revenue Committee and the executive branch. I don't think anyone got exactly what they
