expect the Legislature to continually have the magic bullet that's going to solve property tax because it will never...there never will be a magic bullet. The issue is a process and the issue is, what steps do you do? The levy limits are the crucial key to the process that we have right now. This is an interim step that will help assist going to the drop of a dime in a couple of years. But it is...I think this represents a relationship between the administration and the Revenue Committee, and that it's a positive one. That relationship's not always been there. I can remember several times where that relationship has been extremely strained over the years, so I think that's a positive step. The other part is that there will be some reduction in property tax with the first year of the community college levies. That's what you should focus on. Next year will be another year. There will be another property tax bill again next year and it will all be part of that process. I hope that you would move this one along, and that it is not the panacea, it is not the magic bullet, but it is another step in the process that this Legislature has taken on and oftentimes has not gotten the...
