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most at issue here. Though certainly the amendment is not germane to the underlying bill, it's...the issue is the Schrock amendment, which opened up several sections. I do not see where it opened up Article X, which would be recreational trails, in Chapter 37. Since it didn't open that up, I see no other area that would make it germane and, Senator Tyson, I would rule the amendment not germane. You have the option of overruling the Chair if you choose to do so. And I'd take your...if you have...want to make that motion at this time you can, or you can move to suspend the rules.

SENATOR TYSON: I'm going to move to suspend the rules, 7-3(d).

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Mr. Clerk, motion on the desk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Tyson would move to suspend the germaneness rule, specifically, Rule 7, Section 3(d).

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Senator Tyson, you're recognized to open on your motion to suspend the germaneness ruling.

SENATOR TYSON: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I'm going to be very brief on this. This rule requires, I believe, 30 votes?

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Yes, Senator.

SENATOR TYSON: The Cowboy Trail amendment that we're talking about here is a recreational matter. It is not life and death recreational matter, any more than a lot of other things that we do here, but it is a matter that has to be dealt with at some point in time. And although it may be tenuous in this area, I believe that we should consider this. It's something that we can take care of in a very, very brief and orderly fashion, and it is something that is necessary for the good housekeeping of Game and Parks. I ask for your consideration and I ask for your vote to suspend the rules. Thank you.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Debate on the motion to suspend the germaneness ruling. Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I support the ruling of the Chair and oppose the motion to
