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Brown.

SENATOR BROWN: Mr. President and members, the...I would remind the body that the amendment that we adopted on General File on this that...about the planning process, the five-year plan that is submitted to the federal government that has to do with what their plans are it's very detailed. It is very detailed in terms of what demographic...their developments are going to address, what income levels, what the need is within particular income levels. The information has to be...their plans have to be consistent with the cities plans or the communities plans in terms of their overall development plan. And so this information is already going to be generated in a certain way, but it is in a way that it's required by the federal government and is much less costly. For some small housing authorities, doing this kind of market analysis, is going to be fairly costly and then making it available, which is another part of the amendment, making it available and delaying projects is also going to be...is going to present a real problem for the housing authorities. But I would ask you to consider the amendment that was adopted on General File and what it really requires in terms of the collection of data that is...it's very similar to some of the things that are being required under this amendment, but it's done in a way that there...it's within the...the pattern that they're already doing. I mean they already have the staffing. They're already generating this information. It's in a particular form that they must generate it that way. And so we've already addressed the aspect of making sure that their plans for development are consistent with the community's plans, are economically feasible, address the appropriate demographics, and are justified within...with the market of individuals of low income who need housing. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Brown. Senator Beutler on the Tyson amendment.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Mr. Speaker, members of the Legislature, once again, I don't want to address the Tyson amendment, but I would rather, at least not directly, but I would rather talk about this bill as a whole. And I'd like to take this three or four minutes to talk about the general powers of the housing agencies that are provided for under this bill. And I think one of the
