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course, because the programs are so expensive that they be coordinated to the greatest extent possible. And we try to do that through DHS, Health and Human Services, by focusing in that agency most of the responsibility for assisting people and most of the responsibility for seeing that that assistance is coordinated, one; and two, for seeing that all people in like circumstances have equal access to the assistance. Both of those things are extremely important. So DHH is the center for seeing that this program, as a whole, for those who need assistance, operates smoothly, efficiently, et cetera. But now we have off to the...off to the side an agency that's been there for a long, long time that takes a completely different approach to assisting and that is the approach of owning assets, in part, although they do other things, obviously, but they don't have any responsibility for looking at the big picture and for coordinating and for seeing that all people in like circumstances, everywhere in the state, have the same kind of access and the same kind of advantage or disadvantage.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Now we are expanding that tail on the dog, which is the housing authority, which did part of the work, a piece of the work, and we're saying to it, with this bill, hey, go ahead and do a lot of other things that help with assistance to the poor, all these programs that I just described to you in its purposes, do whatever you think you need to do and, hopefully, it will be coordinated with DHS, DHH and other services, hopefully, maybe it will be the same thing that other housing authorities in other parts of the state are doing, but we know it won't be the same thing. They will be all over the place in terms of how much assistance and how creative and aggressive they are in supplying assistance. So on matters of equity and on matters of coordination, not even talking about...
