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groups, medium, or possibly higher than that, and this is going to then provide me some money that I can use to meet my public obligation to provide low-income housing? Is that what we're about here?

SENATOR BROWN: I...I don't really think that is what we're about. I do think for individual projects, to make those projects go, what you were just talking about, conducting it as a business and making it be economically feasible, is a part of it. But the impetus of this bill, I think, much more than what you're talking about, about the financial aspect...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BROWN: ...of it.

SENATOR RAIKES: Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Tyson, there are no further lights. Did you wish to close on your amendment, FA246?

SENATOR TYSON: No, I think that...I think that people here have a clear understanding of what we're trying to do here. I think the purport of the...of the amendment that we have here now is clear. We want to give an emphasis to joint ventures and cooperative endeavors, and here again I don't want anyone to think that I agree with the basic purpose of this bill, because I don't, I'm trying to make it palatable, barely palatable. What Senator Brown has said, and one of the joys of being here on a microphone all alone, she gets her chance, but she has said that public housing can't make it because the same people that gave you the rank of buildings that were blown down now come back and say, well we didn't do very well on that, we're going to try this, we're going to try this at the expense of everyone, except ourselves. We're going to use your money. We're going to have the most favorable conditions possible, the lowest interest rates possible on the money we borrow. And, of course, you've already had that on the federal money. But we don't have to respond to market conditions. We don't even have to be right. We can be dead wrong, because we're being wrong with your money. I ask for your support of this amendment. Thank
