SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Your light was next, did you want that...did you wish to close? The amendment before us is 1875 to LB 105. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Hartnett's amendment.

SENATOR CUDABACK: AM1875 is adopted. Mr. Clerk, next amendment.

CLERK: Senator Hartnett, I now have AM1820.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Hartnett, may I read into the record there are some visitors here? May I have the opportunity to read these visitors? (Visitors introduced.) Senator Hartnett.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hartnett, I understand, would like to withdraw AM1820.

SENATOR CUDABACK: It is withdrawn.

CLERK: Senator Chambers would move to amend with AM1862. (See Chambers amendment on page 2231 of the Legislative Journal.)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you're recognized to open on your amendment.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I've handed a copy of this amendment around to those who have been actively working on this bill, on both sides, if that's the way it can be described, and it will be on your gadgets. I will tell you the thrust of this amendment, because there are about 33 or so individual items. What I have done is to go through this lengthy bill, I can't say with a fine-tooth comb, because there were areas of it that I did not focus on, such as the financing arrangements, taxing and so forth, but looking at the tremendous overreaching it allowed these agencies when we were dealing with tenants. There are also instances where the language gave too broad a grant of
