because of what's there. I can't see the Fire Marshal allowing this place to stay open. It needs to be torn down. It needs to be replaced. The medical facility out there needs to be replaced and upgraded. I think we're wasting a lot of money here by not going ahead with the funds to redo the facility at Geneva. I told Senator Thompson, when she talked about this, this morning that whatever she done I would support, and that's the way I feel. I understand she is going to pull this after we discuss it a little and I appreciate her doing that, and I appreciate her efforts for what she is doing out there with that facility. But I do just want to make it clear to the body that the little fixing out there, as the old farmers always say, bailing wire and duct tape is not going to fix this facility. We've got to get a little deeper than that. So, with that, I just appreciate the time here to stand here and discuss this and talk about it and hope that we can maybe have a study move forward, but I hate to see us spending that 600,000 for nothing, and that's what we're doing. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schmitt. On the Thompson override motion, Senator Coordsen.

SENATOR COORDSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. Senator Schmitt said what I was going to say probably in a better fashion. Geneva's in my district and so I have been on the Youth Development Train...or Youth Training Center on a number of occasions and I would hope that the administration, quite frankly, rethinks the position with respect to the hall. It's an awful lot of money to spend, as Senator Schmitt indicated, on a renovation, and when we're done there will be a facility that quite probably won't meet the demands. I'm looking here at the yellow sheet that Senator Thompson handed out and looking at all of the downhill, the down slope expenditures in capital construction we've authorized in the last several years. We seem to forget that the Youth Training Centers are as, in many instances, a first chance in a confined facility to provide assistance to young people and perhaps keep them in, six-months later, a year later, five years later, from being a resident of one of the facilities that are...we have almost, what, \$90 million will be spent before they're finished? It's probably better if we would not, in the next six months, spend the money or make the...allocate the contracts at Geneva
