only plant this in your mind to point out that your veto override is important if it were...if it were followed through and I'd probably vote for it, but I would just like to suggest to you and anybody else working at Department of Administrative Services that that's enough money to build a nice motel for a small town, and it's probably enough money to build a nice motel-like facility for 30 girls or more. Just think about that. And I think we ought to get involved with how we intended to spend that \$600,000.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Lynch. Senator Bohlke.

SENATOR BOHLKE: Mr. President and members, just a little bit of information. I was noticing on the handout that one of the buildings there that's currently empty was named after Fannie Crosby (phonetic). Fannie Crosby (phonetic) happened to be a very famous hymn writer. She was a woman who was blind and, I believe, wrote 8,000 hymns to her credit. And if the ghost of Fannie Crosby (phonetic) is there at Geneva, it might bring back to you some of her hymn titles that might...we might apply, hopefully. One is "I See The Light", "Meet Me There", "Oh, Christian, Awake", and "God Be With You Till We Meet Again". Just for your information, she also wrote the hymns, "Be Silent, Be Silent", "Oh, What Are You Going To Do, Brother", "Rescue The Perishing", "Oh, Child Of God, Wait Patiently", "The Bright Forever", and "They Tell Us Of A Land So Fair". I thought it was interesting that the one crumbling building is named after Fannie Crosby (phonetic) and I thought you might like to know a little of the history and some of the hymns that she wrote. I think that if Fannie Crosby (phonetic) were alive today and toured that facility, she would definitely have a new hymn that she'd be writing. Thank you.
