PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Schimek. The question is the adoption of the Schimek amendment to Amendment 1895 to LB 105. Those in favor vote aye; those opposed nay. Voting on the Schimek amendment. Please record.

CLERK: 26 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of the amendment to the amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Mr. Clerk. The amendment is agreed to. Further discussion on Amendment 1895? Senator Schimek, you're recognized to close. Senator Schimek waives closing. The question is the adoption of Amendment 1895 to LB 105. Those in favor vote aye; those opposed nay. Please record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays, Mr. President, on the adoption of Senator Schimek's amendment.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: The amendment is adopted. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment I have, Senator Jensen, AM...it's actually Floor Amendment 239, Senator. (FA239 is found on page 2234 of the Legislative Journal.)

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Senator Jensen, recognized to open on Floor Amendment 239.

SENATOR JENSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the body. This amendment is very simple. It, on page 67, line 7, you strike the word "sixty" and insert "forty". Now public housing has been around for a long time and up until this time, public housing generally was to support those people of low income who could not afford to go out and purchase a home and to...or even, in many cases, to rent a facility that wasn't subsidized. Here we are taking the public housing authorities and allowing them to build units that are substantially for those in a moderate or higher income, and where we have 60 percent of those, in the way the bill is written right now, would qualify, 60 percent of persons with a hundred percent of the median income, I would
