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amendment, you have to understand that there are certain programs that are required by the federal...the feds when they provide assistance. There is this perception or this...the creation, I think, by Senator Beutler of providing services to low-income individuals that are...that meet the typical stereotype of a welfare family. Let's just step back for just a moment, back even from the point of the...of these being required by the federal government, let's step back and look at the reality of who is in these programs, who we're providing services to, who Senator Jones and I have felt so strongly about that we have sponsored this legislation. Elderly people, we have elderly people. What if what Senator Beutler is talking about here means that we cannot provide meal assistance to elderly people? What, and we're talking about social programming here, what if it means something that...that would not be able to keep an elderly person who is living in one of these facilities out of a nursing home by virtue of being able to provide some sort of programming? You know, we're getting into some mind-set about this that it's not about...that it's about the people that we perceive it to be about rather than the people that it is about. And the people that it's about, that Senator Jones and I have seen, are older people, very often people who have physical disabilities. In the Broken Bow Housing Authority, they have a huge waiting list for four units that they have that are available for individuals who are disabled. That's where the waiting list is. They don't have as great a waiting list for just regular units. They have the waiting list for people who are disabled. So we provide some social programs to keep those people in public housing and that means they don't have to go into a nursing home. It's probably going to mean that we're spending a whole lot less of our resources by virtue of doing that. Part of what we're talking about here is not social engineering but what...what we need to provide to individuals who might fall through the cracks under the welfare reform that we have right now, that's going to help them be able to be successful and help us be able to manage our costs. It is in society's interest that people, especially older people who make up most of the residents of housing authorities, have a place to live. That is...that is something that I think is pretty fundamental to society and I don't think that I...
