SENATOR BROMM: Yes, by the person petitioning for the access.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Right.

SENATOR BROMM: Right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So if a person, for example, petitions for access and tells the county commissioners, I just need the space and the right for the public to go through. I don't need any gravel, I don't need any improvement on it, I'll throw my own gravel on it. If the county says all right to that, then he can get the access...he or she can get the access road without...without incurring any expense necessarily.

SENATOR BROMM: That's...that would be right.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Thank you, Senator.

SENATOR BROMM: Sure.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. For discussion on the Bromm amendment to LB 779, Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the Legislature. I would like to visit with Senator Bromm a minute, please.

SENATOR BROMM: Yes.

SENATOR DIERKS: Senator Bromm, I'm...I have a section of school land that neighbors me on my west. It isn't...I don't rent it but it neighbors my ranch on the west. It would be two miles across my property to get to that land. If you came in from the highway, it'd be 2.5 miles from the other side. The cost to putting a road in there would be pretty extensive for a county like Wheeler which has got less than 1,000 citizens, and tries to work very economically. We've had some dealings with them trying to put roads through before and to go across my ranch to get to this section, you go across a lot of wetlands and you go across a lot of blowing sand and you can't just do an egress-ingress thing, I believe, because you're going to have to
