SENATOR BROMM: Well...

SENATOR DIERKS: And the other thing is I would...can I ask him to put a couple wells in for me because I'm going to have my pasture divided?

SENATOR BROMM: I don't think so. Senator Dierks, could I ask...

SENATOR DIERKS: Well, all I can do is just be mad, is that it?

SENATOR BROMM: Well, how do they get there now?

SENATOR DIERKS: They just ride their horses or whatever they do to...

SENATOR BROMM: But whose land do they go through?

SENATOR DIERKS: Sometimes they go by mine, sometimes they go...come in from the west. Most of the time they come in from the west.

SENATOR BROMM: Well, I...you know, this doesn't change what the law is now with respect to private owners getting to isolated tracts, and I don't follow...something that never came up in any of the discussions on this was the fact that there would need to be a fence, because you would be able to use your land just as you've used it before other than the fact that you would have a trail through it. But normally those trails are not fenced off, are they?

SENATOR DIERKS: No, but if you're going down a county...designated county line...

SENATOR BROMM: This wouldn't necessarily be on a county line.

SENATOR DIERKS: Oh, it wouldn't?

SENATOR BROMM: No.
