your view, and I don't happen to like term limits, that the people approved term limits. And maybe somehow or other this would have changed the outcome with respect to that effort. I don't think so. The people approved term limits, not once but twice, which is what we're asking the threshold be with LR 18CA. I don't see the need for LR 18CA, but I'd be willing to certainly spend some more time and listen to the people before taking the final vote on it. And I think that would be the wise...the wiser course to take. I don't think the image of this body is necessarily, in the view of some people, elevated by the passage of this proposal and placing it on the ballot, particularly without some additional discussion. So those are primarily the reasons why I am not going to be supporting it. I do think...I do think the constitution should be a document that's changed very, very deliberately and very carefully and very rarely. And, with that, I think I agree with the proponents of this measure. But I think the thoughtful discussion that was held on...

SENATOR CROSBY: One minute.

SENATOR BROMM: ...LB 413 and other measures that have been proposed, generally lead to a pretty good result. And I don't see the burning need for this change to our constitution. And if our constitution should be changed only in those circumstances where it is very, very necessary to do so, then why do we propose this change? And why do we propose it without perhaps letting it lay over until next session and get some more input from our constituents before taking a final vote. That generally is my feeling and why I would prefer to see LR 18CA sit in this Unicameral, at least until next January. Thank you.

SENATOR CROSBY: Thank you, Senator Bromm. (Visitors introduced.) Continuing the debate, Senator Dierks, followed by Kristensen, Wickersham, Jones, Brown, and Chambers. Senator Dierks.

SENATOR DIERKS: Thank you, Madam President, members of the Legislature. I envy so much the ability of some of the people to express their opinions in here, such as that that Senator Bromm just did. If I were able to have that same opportunity, if I could do these things with the eloquence that some of the
