deletes some obsolete language, and would reinstate or make sure and clarify that the compensation of a thousand dollars per month would stay in place until the commission would meet and make their recommendation. I would urge its adoption.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: You've heard the closing on AM1927 to LR 4CA. All in favor vote aye; all opposed vote nay. Record, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: 46 ayes, 0 nays, Madam President, on the adoption of Senator Kristensen's amendment.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Is there anything else, Mr. Clerk?

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Madam President.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Senator Smith.

SENATOR SMITH: Madam President, I move the advancement of LR 4CA to E & R for engrossing.

SENATOR C. PETERSON: All in favor say aye. All opposed say nay. The bill is advanced. Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 5CA on Select File, no E & R. Senator Kristensen would move to amend with AM1926. (Legislative Journal pages 2386-2387.)

SENATOR C. PETERSON: Senator Kristensen.

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: Thank you, Madam President. Members of the Legislature, this does similar in terms of putting this before the voters on the May 2000 election. It deletes the same obsolete language, the '64 elections, and it retains the Executive Board Committee's amendment that we've adopted at \$2,000 per month. I would suggest the same approach here is that, throughout the summer, we do some sampling, do some...some taking of the temperature of our constituents in the state as a whole. What this would do also is strikes language "not to exceed", which precedes the salary amount. This change would then set the specific salary amount in the constitution. Thus, you eliminate the need for implementing legislation. It's
