SENATOR BRASHEAR: Mr. President, thank you. Members of the body, I...I'm going to try and be responsive to some of these things where people asked for a response. I really believe that we are on track in terms of what we're doing. I appreciate the Speaker's comments and indication that he's going to be supportive, and Senators Jensen and Jones. It's very important. I want to try and speak to Senator Jensen's concerns. I think any time you're dealing with justice we're always going to be in a constant period of reexamination. But, so we don't make this seem more overwhelming or monumental than it is, I'd like to point out that the opinions I've talked about throughout the debate have been with regard to capital cases. The statutes relate to capital cases and the proportionality study is going to deal with capital cases and those which could or might have been, and those are my words. So there are some parameters built around this study. Now it might be nice to have a proportionality study as to many, many other things and maybe, as we do our work together throughout the course of Nebraska history, maybe we'll go there. But here I think the focus is...I know the focus is that we're dealing with proportionality as it relates to capital cases because our Supreme Court has directed our attention there, we have statutes that apply there and because, and I'm not trying to be funny, because we are dealing with a penalty which, once inflicted, is irrevocable, it's irreversible, it is ultimate. So, while we may have proportionality issues with regard to what are called lesser crimes, here we're dealing with capital cases and capital punishment, and I think that gives us some sense of boundary and then, if we're going to go beyond that or below that or however you might characterize it, we're going to have to take further action as a body. We also have our courts and, yes, we can trust it to the courts. But then, when they, in dealing with these kinds of issues, send it back to us and say, for reasons of separation of powers and the like, we need you to act, then that's why we're trying to be responsive here. Is that...can you indicate, Senator Jensen, was that responsive? Okay. I would...not to belabor this or prolong the record, I...seems to me there's an indication on the floor that people are reacting favorably to this. That's another thing that you should be thanked for. The object here is simply only to know the truth. That's what the search for justice is, is to obtain the truth. With the facts which would come back to us from the Nebraska
