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vote. We let the session run out and it dies at the end, because we don't have what it takes to say this is bad legislation and we ought to kill it. So my proposal is that we leave things as they are and if the Judiciary has too many bills that would be based on the number we get, if some are saying we're getting too many bills. But I think we can kill a lot more bills than we do without lingering over them and doing favors to our colleagues, and our colleagues will then stop coming to the Judiciary Committee, which they all say has too many bills, and ask, this is a bad bill but don't kill it yet. Don't let that stand anymore. If they say kill it, then we kill it immediately. Soon as we get into Exec Session that bill is over, the quietus. When we get the same bills that we have over and over and over, even though they will get a different senator from time to time, usually a young one, a new one wet behind the ears, so proud and flattered to have the Governor or the Attorney General say, introduce this bill, kill it. Not the messenger. We don't kill our colleague. Kill the bill, I'm talking about, and then they will catch on and they will tell these people, no, I...you can't get me to offer that to the Judiciary...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...Committee, because they are a committee that is not going to accept that. I will tell you what, I hear a lot more respect accorded the Revenue Committee than is accorded the Judiciary Committee and I hear a lot of people say that has no chance in the Revenue Committee, but any piece of trash, and not all the legislation is trash by any means, people will say, well, yeah, that will go through the Judiciary Committee. They are the garbage committee. Send it to them and I can even get them not to kill it right away. I'm against all these changes and Senator Beutler is correct when he says that this amendment I'm offering is not really the issue but it's a part of it. I'm going to take all of my time that is available to me on these rules because they brought this to us and I'm going to see that all of it is thoroughly discussed.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. On the Chambers amendment, Senator Schrock.
