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SENATOR BEUTLER: ...it deserves to be reintroduced, and so do a lot of other things. And bottom line is the workers, the committee people in Judiciary and the public and everybody deserves an equal opportunity for all of those bills that come through Judiciary, the same kind of opportunity for good public input, for good committee input, for good interplay of forces that exists on most other committees in our Legislature. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Beutler. On the Chambers amendment, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I was a member of the committee when Senator Beutler was the Chair, I've been a member of that committee for going on 30 years, and I do, Senator Beutler, know the difference between trash and antiques. Now, perhaps a layperson does know the difference, may think that simply because something is old and shoddy that it's an antique. But if a person is an antique dealer and has principle and integrity and standards, it behooves that person to point out to the individual the differences and why those differences actually make a difference. So I don't simply say that legislation is trash for no reason. When that trash gets out on the floor, after I've asked a few questions of the introducer, members on the floor begin to see that they share the opinion of it that I have, and those of you know who you are who have come to me and asked me repeatedly, how does this stuff get out of the Judiciary Committee? You all know who you are. And Senator Beutler, on occasion, may have wondered that himself. And it's not because I'm not there as...well, Senator Beutler, at one time, dubbed me the Grim Culler, C-u-l-l-e-r...Reaper. I'm not going to, in order just to get along with people, say that any and everything that's introduced is of value. Senator Beutler and nobody else has decided to deal with the issue that I raised about people bringing to them trash legislation, that the introducer knows is trash legislation, that the introducer will ask the committee to kill, but with the proviso--not right now. They don't want to deal with all these realities, but I'm going to deal with them because I'm there and I've been there for decades and I've seen it repeat itself over, and over, and over. Those who do not
