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learn the lessons of history are doomed to something or other, and those who have been on the legislative...Legislature's Judiciary Committee for three decades is doomed to see the same pieces of trash over, and over, and over. And, Senator Beutler, when I use that term, I don't mean that simply because something is offered repeatedly that brands it trash, and that is not what I said. I said the same kind of trash legislation comes back again, and again, and again. And I'm still maintaining that if when our colleagues bring us this trash legislation that they know that term properly describes it, and will tell us, I had to bring it because a constituent gave it to me, but I don't think it has merit, and kill it, until you-all stop doing that, stop criticizing the number of bills that the Judiciary Committee gets. And until we on the committee assume our responsibility to kill that trash legislation, we need to stop whining and putting up a pitiful mouth about it being too hard for us; we cannot cut the mustard; we cannot keep up. Senator Beutler knows when he was chairperson there were many days that I was here into the night. I was the last one standing often during Judiciary Committee hearings, because I felt people should have the opportunity to make their point. But on occasion some people are allowed to make their point too many times and at too great a length when they know, because the chairman often will ask the question, that there are others...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...who want the opportunity to address the issue. So if the chairman or the chairwoman does not assert some kind of leadership in trying to be at least a traffic director, one person is going to take all of the time, and those others in the audience are not going to be understanding when the chairperson might say, well I couldn't cut that individual off. They do feel that there is to be some management of the time by the chairperson in the committee. Now, if the work is too hard, you have my sympathy, but we have to stay there and do it. And I'm not in favor of these changes, despite Senator Beutler's attempt to show that there is validity here. You haven't heard anybody talking about...
