But when you have these titles written from the top of the door down to the floor and across the hallway, that person, when you open the door, is going to be somebody sitting in a broom closet doing nothing and is rewarded with titles. The length of the name of the committee is not an argument in favor of doing what this proposal by the Rules Committee is offering us. They may have worked hard, but I'm sure the people, Senator Redfield, who built the Tower of Babel had worked hard, too. They were trying to build that tower up into the heavens, and they had done a lot of work. You know how high they had gotten while trying to build their way to heaven? They had gotten 12 feet in the air with their stones when God decided to mix up their languages and knock the whole thing down. But they had worked hard. The person who built his house on the sand worked hard, too, but not wisely. So the mere fact that a lot of effort is put into something does not necessarily mean that the finished product is worthy of acceptance. The Rules Committee has had their hard work recognized by everybody, except me, because I work hard too. I have worked hard reading what they've given to us. But I will join the praise that we give for our colleagues, the Rules Committee worked hard. Now we need to get rid of this thing that they've given to us. When Senator Bromm, bless his soul, stood up to talk about why the Rules Committee did this, he said it was to restructure the workload, and that's what everybody has been talking about, so I'm not discounting what Senator Bromm said. But if that's so, why are you changing the number of committee members so that each committee has nine or six? And why are you doing away with the right of the members to trade assignments? If all you're doing is structuring workload,...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

And these other things, one of them at least, is more sinister than what we're talking about here in terms of combining these two committees. But you're not going to do that, you're not going to combine those two committees. All those who were worried about that happening, I give you my assurance it's not going to happen. Now when have I ever stood on the floor and spoken with such certitude and misled you? Will this be the first time? And, by the way, this is not the
