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SENATOR JENSEN: They do.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and all of that? Well, my time is up, so I'll have to put on my light, then I want to proceed.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Proceed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, suppose a person, because of a sincerely held belief, which some people call a conscience matter, cannot conscientiously, without violating his or her conscience, principles, and maybe condemning his or her immortal soul, if they believe in things like that, to hell, such a person so situated could not comply with the law. If that person for those reasons does not comply with the law, do those considerations prevent the state from imposing a punishment on that person for violating the law?

SENATOR JENSEN: No, it does not.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So they say, even though it's a matter of conscience, you and your conscience must go to the hoosegow, if that's the punishment?

SENATOR JENSEN: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But one good thing, they can't put you in solitary confinement because, if you have your conscience, you at least have company. Is that right?

SENATOR JENSEN: I would think so.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Jensen, I appreciate your help, thank you. And I know some of my colleagues did not pay much attention to that but, further down in the discussion, what Senator Jensen spoke with us about, by way of his answers, is going to come into play. But what I want us to have an opportunity to do first is to thoroughly discuss these issues. If nobody is of a mind to degrade, demean, low rate, denigrate or do away with the Ag Committee, why don't they just stand on the floor and tell me that, that we're willing to reinstate the Agriculture Committee, reinstate the Natural Resources Committee, strike the reference to this Agriculture, Environment
