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these older people who are constantly criticizing the inferiority of education that children are getting today would demonstrate to me...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...the superior education that they apparently got when better education was being dispensed, but I don't see it manifested in them. So who are the people who got this better education? Adults now don't even know what...they don't know what the Bill of Rights are. If you say, well, it had ten provisions, then they'll start trying to tick off the Ten Commandments the best they can, not knowing the difference between the Ten Commandments and the Bill of Rights, because each of them has ten.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Chambers, you're recognized to continue.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the man who was in office, and he was mentally challenged, when this country, the colonies, wanted to break away and commit treason against their sovereign was George III. Yes, when the colonies and America broke away, they committed treason. But because they won, they're considered patriots and heroes. But Americans are descendents of treasonous individuals. Nevertheless, there was a guy named Lord North who was not the king, and he had perhaps more to do with the revolution, as they called it, rather than treason, that took place when the colonies and America broke away from their English masters, and he dealt with revenue measures; put a little bitty tax on tea, a little bitty inconsequential tax on tea. Everybody who drank tea could afford it, but those who were fomenting treason needed an issue that the public at large could comprehend, and that was one that was small enough to inflame them. So, as often happens, these white people, dressed up in what they considered to be the way Native Americans dressed to shift the blame, went aboard this boat and threw all these casks of tea into the Boston Harbor, but what they said was they were conducting an experiment--they wanted to see if tea could be made from saltwater. There was a small tax put on newspapers and other documents and that made people angry, little bitty things like
