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didn't, he made the point but he didn't prove it, Senator Engel make the point, didn't prove it, Senator Janssen made the point, didn't prove it, but I don't expect them to be able to prove. They can't go out and do a survey on their own. But guess what? The tobacco industry certainly could. As a matter of fact, they have their own research institute funded by them with a nice neutral name that they do a lot of their own studies on. The kinds of stuff that used to claim that smoking wasn't addictive or couldn't be proven to be addictive, guess where those studies came from. From a phoney-baloney institute funded by the tobacco industry. They've got plenty of money. If there were statistics out there to discover, they could discover them. Where are they? Senator Baker, where is the support for the claims you made? Senator Janssen, Senator Engel, where is the claim that there really is no change? And there is a second reason why we need to scratch our heads. Look, if the tobacco companies really were just going to sell those things in Missouri or Kansas or Iowa, and they were all going to sell the same amount of packs of cigarettes, they wouldn't be out here fighting this, would they, because it wouldn't make a difference. They are going to sell that pack of cigarettes anyway, aren't there, whether they sell them in Nebraska or Kansas? If Senator Baker's argument is right, Senator Janssen's argument is right, then there is no reason to have Walt and Bob and Dennis and the very hefty amount of money that is being spent to lobby against this bill spent. Why? Because they are going to make that sale anyway. They don't have to sell Adrian on why it is bad for border bleeding because they are going to sell them, they are going to sell them in Colorado and Wyoming, and it's going to be no skin off their nose if that argument is right. The point is the reason that they are out there is because that argument isn't true. They can't prove it. Nobody here can prove it, and there is a darn good reason just from their very presence to assume that it does affect the tobacco industry. Not only can you do it by logic; you can do it by looking at what the tobacco industry says itself. Their internal secret documents say exactly what I'm saying. Let me read some to you because, you see, Senator Janssen and Senator Baker and Senator Engel, well meaning, concerned about border bleeding, are simply not accurate.
