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its face that a change has to take place from the way things are, and the way we make sure that that change takes place, because it's not taking place on its own, is to mandate it and say that whoever is in a position to carry out the responsibilities of this policy shall do it. We're not making a suggestion. We are putting in place a legislative policy based on our understanding of what is best for this society in the given area where we are operating. And I don't know of anybody, other than Senator Tyson, and maybe he wouldn't do this, who will stand on the floor and say, we do not think that women are entitled to fair consideration. I doubt that anybody on this floor would say we think women are treated as fairly in medicine or any other area as they ought to be treated. I bet there are not five people on this floor who can name five women who have done anything of significance in history, because we're not taught about anything that women have done. And I don't mean saying, well, Mrs. Roosevelt was the wife of Teddy Roosevelt or FDR. I don't mean like that, where a woman on her own, and you can't use Sacagawea because she's going to be the one on the new dollar coin and that's not fair. You all know, if you delve into your own mind, you don't know much about anything that women have done. You talk about the founding fathers. What about the...

SPEAKER KRISTENSEN: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...founding mothers who had to put up with them? You never hear that. I am going to continue to do, as an individual and a member of this Legislature, everything I can to demonstrate not only that I think women are treated unfairly but that something ought to be done about it. I don't pussyfoot and shilly-shally. I've got colleagues in here who pussyfoot to such an extent on these issues that, as I've said before, you can stretch a piano keyboard from the Pacific Ocean to the Atlantic Ocean and they can dance all the way across that keyboard without striking a single note. That's how they pussyfoot. And then, when they talk to these agencies or associations or women's groups to try to get some political support, they talk about, oh, I'm for women's issues, oh, yes, I'm almost a feminist myself.
