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for women for heart attacks are different from men. We frequently hear that list of symptoms but, through education, we can help women recognize symptoms that are more likely to happen to them. For example, the symptoms for women are upper abdominal pain, labored breathing, nausea, or fatigue. Women develop chest pain more often than men, but chest pain is likely to develop in myocardial infarction, a heart attack, in women when compared with men. Also, in addition to the symptoms, things happen for women at different stages in their life and, because we have done so much research on men's health and not women's health, we know in some cases not everyone is educated on the most recent information on women's health and the ways to treat some of these conditions. Just another area of public health for women is osteoporosis, a very preventable condition that affects a lot of older women and makes their lives less comfortable in their old age and often puts them in nursing home conditions. So, through the efforts of the large group of people that have worked on this initiative, one of the things we're trying to do is create a greater awareness of women's health issues, things you can do to improve your health, preventative measures that can be taken, the knowledge that is out there that we have and we're beginning to learn in recent history about the differences between the symptoms for women in health conditions, what happens to women, and so we can live healthier lives, and lives, as was pointed out yesterday, that though good information will be targeting our scarce resources as a state to be most effective. So I hope we can get off these side issues, which we've clearly wanted to make clear weren't going to be part of what this commission is about and, clearly, I think Senator Schimek has made an attempt through her amendment to make that clear. She's worked with a lot of people on this and I think we should support her version of this...

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: One minute.

SENATOR THOMPSON: ...over Senator Tyson's version. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MAURSTAD: Thank you, Senator Thompson. Senator Chambers, your light is on, but you've spoken three times.
