were speaking, Senator Pederson, and one is that this bill allows for public-private partnerships. We are establishing a fund in the bill which would mean we could take private funds for initiatives, and I envision that this commission is probably very necessary to that effort. We are asking to have corporate people on that board, we're asking to have medical professionals on that board, and I won't go into all the details, but a fairly well-rounded committee. We know that there are a number of pharmaceuticals, for instance, that have lots of grant monies...

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Okay.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...that we may be able to access if we have something like this in place. The second point I would like to make is that we have...we have great confidence in the Department of Health in that I believe they have been doing some things, but nobody over there is really focused in this arena. We know for a fact that often different divisions over there don't know what the other divisions are doing in terms of women's health, so we think that it would bring greater coordination to this effort. There was a third point I was going to make and I've forgotten what it is, but those are my two off-the-top-of-the-head responses.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: Well, there's an additional initiative called Every Woman Matters...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Right.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...that's funded by...partially by the federal government, partially by state funds, and the purpose of that is for breast and cervical cancer screening and...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Correct.

SENATOR D. PEDERSON: ...things of that nature, is it not? And I guess my concern is that,...
