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for everybody. I started out with a fundamentally conservative approach to this whole thing, the old conservatism--government shouldn't be interfering in basic economic decisions; let business go wherever the business decisions for setting up a business made sense for it to go. That's classic conservative economics. But then came the industrial development bonds in Alabama in the 1950s and they started getting government into that decision making. I mean let's not talk anymore about government staying in the decision making in one area and out of it in another. We've been in it up to our gills since the last century when we created corporations. Maybe we should go back, get government out of everything. Let's not have any more corporations. Let's just let individuals compete. Why, we'd all say I'm ridiculous, and of course I would be because the corporations have been an enlightened industrial tool. But don't forget we created the corporation and then we started creating everything else after that, that is the American capitalist system. And it doesn't make any sense to say hands off this part of the system.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BEUTLER: We are managing the system. We manage it at the federal level, through economic policy, we manage it all levels of government. And I think what we must come to is an understanding of what is a fair sharing of the productivity gains from that economy. And we are in a bind right now because now we understand, not only must we retain the LB 775 benefits for the few, which enhanced the inequality problem, but now LB 775 is not going to be enough, because other states are doing more. Now we got to compete in another round, another cycle, and down we go again. The rich will be given more because they need to keep industry in Nebraska, and the poor, apparently, are not going to do nearly as well. I think that those are central concerns...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...that must be a part of this debate and every debate on economic incentives.
