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the spread between the haves and the have-nots. I'm going to ignore those at all by not mentioning them. I'm simply going to say this bill doesn't do a thing about that. This bill is not a redistribution of the wealth bill. This is not a bill that has some grand and noble purpose that will result from the collection of additional monies from these people and a redistribution of wealth. This...and this bill is not about, I respectfully submit, rich people. That is such a fun political target to stand and talk about rich people. You heard Senator Wickersham lay out the qualifications. It is ownership of stock in a corporation. It is five or more shareholders, two of which cannot be related. So when the bill was drafted it was drafted in such a way that we could not have a bunch of lawyers and accountants structuring this for some untoward advantage. But while Senator Wickersham...while the bill would put in "publicly traded", this is about closely held corporations also. This is about somebody who, yes, an entrepreneur who owns a business in the state of Nebraska and rewards employees with stock. And I don't think anybody here is going to say that our property taxes are not high. And I don't think anybody is going to argue that our income tax is not high. And we cannot be all things to all people in tax policy, I truly do understand that. But this is one thing I respectfully suggest that 12 years ago we did right. This is where we did something that others weren't doing. We said that if you invest your money in Nebraska, if you have operations in this state...and we're not letting fly-by-night people do it. It's not for one year. You have to have had operations in this state for more than three years to qualify. Operations in this state, stock that doesn't have any value, if a business doesn't make any money, the stock doesn't have any value, so there's nothing to talk about. We are talking about successful businesses and we're talking about successful businesses that make money in Nebraska, pay wages in Nebraska, produce the multiplier effect that every member of this body is familiar with, that fuel the economic engine of this state. And you all know that if you go back and look, we had 70, more than 70 straight years of depopulation. We're still experiencing it in our rural areas, and it's a serious problem which this body needs to address a part of making good public policy. But...
