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it's all right, so we'll put roaches in the food. No. They also encourage people to wash their hands in restaurants, and if there are certain types of bacteria found in the food and certain unsanitary conditions they'll shut them down. Now Senator Hilgert may not know that. Now if at home, when you come out of the rest room and you use this one-ply toilet tissue and you, in effect, use your hands rather than the tissue, and you don't wash your hands at home, that's nasty but you can do that. It's not encouraged for restaurant workers. And I don't encourage it for my colleagues in the Legislature either. I'm not shaking hands during flu season, that's my excuse right now. But for me flu season is going to be 365 days a year, because I'm sensitive about things like that. Sanitation is something that is of concern, not just because the idea of being clean is next to godliness, no, but because it relates to health. So if healthful conditions are desired in a restaurant, a place open to the public, the public is invited, children are invited, then that which endangers the health can be regulated by the state. There's not even any question about that being a fact. As Senator Preister and others have always pointed out when these discussions occur, smoke does not show any consideration for people who don't want to be subjected to it. I have gone to restaurants where there is supposed to be no smoking in one part of it, but you smell smoke there and I exercise my prerogative to leave. But when we're going to give these people a license that allows them to do that which is prohibited to others, then they can expect regulation. Bars and taverns and other sellers and purveyors of alcoholic beverages to the public operate private businesses, but the liquor industry is the most highly regulated industry in this society. Would Senator Hilgert give the same argument for leaving them alone and letting them do whatever they want to do? Absolutely not, but he's speaking for the restaurateurs. And by the way, the "N" is not present in their name. Restaurant, but it's not "restauranteur", it's restaurateur. That bothers me, too. Now,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: (Laugh) Somebody is kind of messing with me over here. I'm going to support this bill. I don't think it's an improper encroachment on any rights of those who are operating these restaurants or on those who smoke, it's not
