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SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, would you yield?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Smith, if you didn't have this what you called civil liberties argument, do you have any other argument you would offer against this bill?

SENATOR SMITH: No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, what civil liberty do you think is infringed upon and whose civil liberty?

SENATOR SMITH: The right to own property and allow...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR SMITH: ...to own property and allow the consumption of a legal substance.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now they can own...is liquor consumable at every establishment? If an establishment is open to children, is liquor consumable there?

SENATOR SMITH: There are...yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What...hard liquor?

SENATOR SMITH: I'm not certain of all of the details of the liquor laws, but I know that a law-abiding citizen can obtain a liquor license to serve liquor and...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Where children are present?

SENATOR SMITH: That is correct.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay, that is something I wasn't aware of, hard liquor. Anyway, I do not think his argument is a good one, because when you use this so-called legal substance, even the way it's recommended, it is hazardous to the health, even to the point of being fatal. And I think my time is up, so I won't pursue it, but thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator
